



Escaping the Zero-Sum Game: Liberation in the Here and Now

The Trilemma of Happiness

Most people choose between two illusions:

1. Suffer now, imagining happiness in the afterlife.
2. Imagine happiness now, expecting real suffering later.
3. Be truly happy now *and* later—a path deemed impossible by 99% of humanity.

This zero-sum logic assumes true fulfillment requires trade-offs: earthly joy costs eternal damnation, or ascetic denial buys heavenly reward. Yet the third option exists, exemplified by the *Jivanmukta* of Advaita Vedanta—the "liberated while living." This sage realizes their identity as Brahman *here and now*, free from ego, karma, and illusion (*Maya*), acting without attachment in eternal bliss (*Satchidananda*).

Gods of the Zero-Sum: Christianity and Satanism

Both the Christian God and the Satanic archetype enforce this game. Christianity demands suffering now (cross-bearing, renunciation) for promised paradise later—a deferred reward that vilifies present joy as sin. Satanism flips it: indulge now (egoism, sensuality), pay later with ruin or hellfire. Dualism reigns—good vs. evil, heaven vs. hell—where one side's gain is the other's loss. No room for non-dual unity.

Societal Echoes: Egoism, Capitalism, Nationalism

Erich Fromm nails the glue holding fractured relations: mutual antagonism. Individuals hoard "their share" of happiness, fearing others' gain diminishes theirs. Scaled up, capitalism becomes a religion of endless debt—profit now breeds guilt and collapse later, per Walter Benjamin. Nationalism collectivizes the trap: "Our nation's win is your loss," fueling wars and borders that orbit scarcity, never touching abundance.

Health follows suit: people cling to illness (broken spines, burnout), threatened by holistic wellness now. Why heal when suffering justifies future "rewards"? Work 40 years for a pensioned "freedom"—a pension that never comes, just as afterlife promises evade the grave.

The Victim Cult and Karma's Wheel

This is "black morality": self-ruin as virtue, sacrifice as piety. Religions, economies, nations thrive on victims—blood for gods, labor for capital, lives for glory. Zero-sum play generates *karma*: every action-reaction binds you to samsara's periphery, circling the universe's nullpoint (Brahman) without entering. Gain or loss? Both fuel the orbit.

Non-zero-sum living—*niṣkāma karma*, Vaishnava *līlā*—pierces the center. Actions flow unbound, joyful, spontaneous: Krishna's divine play in Goloka, leaving no trace. No karma accrues; you dwell in the nullpoint's zero-point energy—pure being, nondestructive, eternally free.

Fear of the Inner Center

The paradox: zero-sum players circle Brahman but dread its core. Why? The nullpoint dissolves the ego-self, silencing drama, antagonism, and identity. To enter is to die to separation—terrifying for those addicted to periphery chaos. Societies build distractions (consumption, conflict) to avoid it; individuals prefer familiar pain to radical wholeness.

Liberation: No Victims, Only Play

We need no sacrifices. The universe is not zero-sum; Brahman *is* the nullpoint of infinite fullness. Jivanmukta, Fromm's productive lover, the cosmopolite—they live it: happiness now multiplies later, without loss. Drop the game. Dance *līlā*. Peace to all non-zero-sum spirits.
